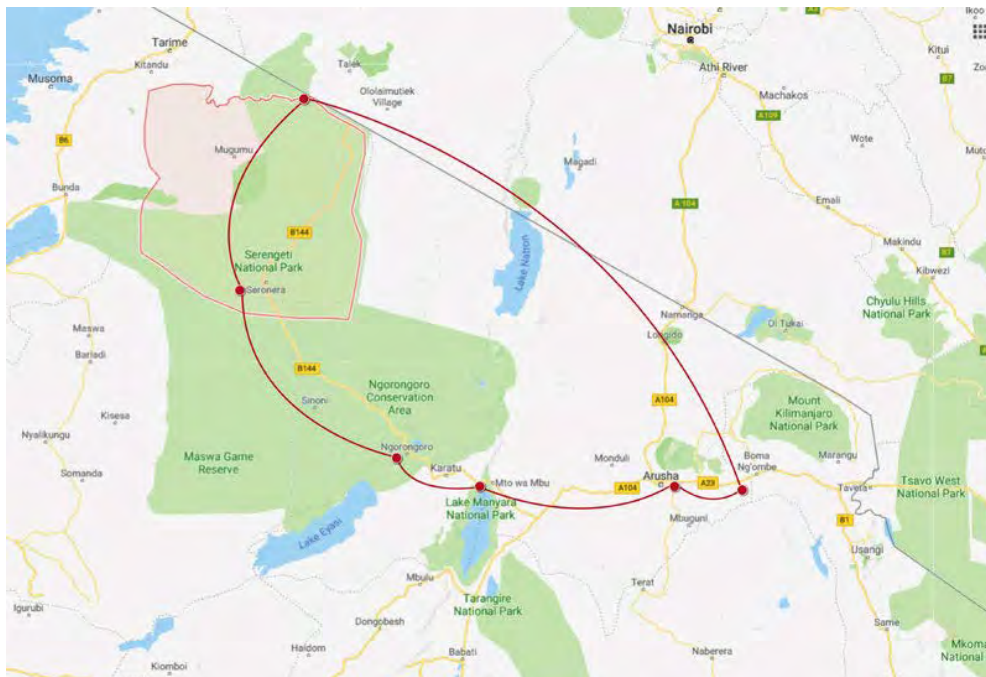


Martin Cohen

Day 1 : Kahawa House, Arusha

(Sun, 04 July)

Arusha

Resting at the foot of Mount Meru, the sprawling city of Arusha is known as the safari capital of northern Tanzania. It serves as an excellent base from which to explore the remarkably scenic surrounding area which includes majestic Mount Kilimanjaro, as well as the Manyara, Tarangire and Ngorongoro National Parks. Arusha is a good spot to take a day or two off from the safari circuit as it features a temperate climate and lush surrounds. Visitors can look forward to exploring the wildlife-abundant Serengeti National Park; the magnificent Arusha National Park; and taking on the challenge of climbing Mount Meru, Africa's fifth highest mountain.

Day Itinerary

We arrive JRO (Kilimanjaro International Airport) and transfer to Kahawa House, a homely lodge situated in a suburban area in northern Tanzania in Arusha, 6km southwest of the centre of town. The accommodation provides convenient access to Arusha Domestic Airport and is an ideal rest stop for visitors to Arusha National Park. Facilities include a swimming pool as well as a deck where guests can enjoy lunch and dinner.

Day Itinerary

After breakfast and a morning briefing we will be collected from Kahawa House and transfer to Manyara National Park, about a 3,5 hour drive East across the Masai Steppe. Following a short game drive around Manyara Nat. Park we will break for a picnic lunch before continuing our game drive en route. Lake Manyara Nat. Park boasting over 400 species of birds inhabiting the parks wetlands, Manyara is a birdwatchers paradise. Although seldom sighted the park boasts healthy populations of Leopards and Lions as well as receiving regular visits from wandering Cheetah. Expect to see large troupes of Chacma Baboons, Elephants, Blue Monkeys, Dik-Dik, Hippopotamus, Masai Giraffe, Impala, Zebras and Cape Buffalo as well as a host of other species that make this a worthwhile stop on our journey. After lunch we continue our journey to Ngorongoro Farm House, our home for the next three days.

After breakfast we depart Ngorongoro Farm House for a full day game drive exploring the world famous Ngorongoro Crater. A World Heritage site, the crater has the highest density of large mammals found anywhere on earth, a veritable Garden of Eden for African wildlife. Lunch will be served at a suitable site on the Crater floor before returning to our lodging that evening.

Tucked away in the foothills of the Crater, Ngorongoro Farm House offers an old African farmhouse style charm complete with rolling green lawns, lush flower beds and a kitchen garden that has to be seen to be believed! Their version of "farm to table" is within walking distance ensuring your meals are prepared with the freshest ingredients imaginable.

Ngorongoro Crater

Located in Northern Tanzania, the Ngorongoro Crater is best known for its natural beauty and abundance of diverse wildlife; which makes it one of Africa's most popular safari destinations. Surrounded by Tanzania's highlands, this UNESCO-listed crater is said to be the world's largest intact volcanic caldera. Visitors can look forward to spotting the world-renowned Big Five and a host of other wildlife species including large herds of Zebra and Wildebeest. It is famed as one of Tanzania's best tourist attractions offering visitors an array of wonderful activities including excellent bird watching, trekking and wildlife viewing .



Day Itinerary

After breakfast we make our way to the Crater Floor for a full day game drive in the Ngorongoro Conservation Area (NCA) it is a protected area and a World Heritage Site located 180 km (110 mi) west of Arusha in the Crater Highlands area of Tanzania. The area is named after Ngorongoro Crater. The conservation area is administered by the Ngorongoro Conservation Area Authority, an arm of the Tanzanian government, and its boundaries follow the boundary of the Ngorongoro Division of the Arusha Region. The 2009 Ngorongoro Wildlife Conservation Act placed new restrictions on human settlement and subsistence farming in the Crater, displacing Masai pastorals, most of whom had been relocated to Ngorongoro from their ancestral lands to the North when the British colonial government established Serengeti National Park in 1959.

Day Itinerary

Today we fly from Manyara Airstrip to Kogatende in Northern Serengeti near the world famous Mara River where we will spend the next five days exploring this diverse area which lies on the usual path of the migration. It is important to understand that the migration is a seasonal event that usually takes place over a six to eight week window and is driven by the timing of the rains. Our strategy is to time our visit to coincide with the middle of this window and set aside a decent amount of time to maximize our chance of catching this event in full swing. Assuming we get the timing right and arrive in the middle of the migration the next trick is to catch the herds in the act of crossing the river but this requires a lot of patience and a large dash of good fortune! Thanks to the ever-present threat of Crocodiles the Wildebeest are fearful so there needs to be a build up on the Southern bank until some brave soul takes the plunge and then there is a mad rush by the massing herds not to be left behind. To catch these events you need to have patience to sit and wait and then just as suddenly as they start they are over. It might be five, or fifty, minutes but I promise you that if you are fortunate enough to be in the right place at the right time, they will be some of the most exciting minutes of your life!

Northern Serengeti

The vast, rolling Savannah of the Northern Serengeti is known as the hub of the great migration. The landscape is characterized by vast stretches of Savannah interspersed with Acacia trees and Riverine woodlands. Wildlife can be seen along the banks of the Mara River and visitors can view the annual spectacle of the half a million migrating Wildebeest. Commonly spotted wildlife include: a multitude of plains game such as Buffalo, Zebra, Gazelles, Impala, Giraffe as well as Lion and Leopard. Visitors can look forward to bird watching, game drives.



Mara Under Canvas

Our accommodation in Serengeti North is a charming luxury tented camp set amidst cool Acacia trees and whispering grasslands. Located within an easy drive of the Mara River, guests have access to some of the best locations from which to experience the epic "River Crossing" where, during the annual migration, millions of Wildebeest, Zebra and Gazelles cross the Crocodile infested river in search of greener pastures in the Masai Mara, a once in a lifetime experience! The Camp is located in a secluded area of the vast Serengeti where guests are delighted by the quality of service and luxury in the wild. The dining and bar-lounge tent provide a relaxing atmosphere overlooking the great savanna plains. The luxury tents have great views of the savanna plains, easy outside deck chairs provide a perfect setting for reading, or just relaxing and enjoying the scenery. Each tent has an en-suite bathroom with bucket showers and flushing toilets.

Day 7: Mara Under Canvas, Northern Serengeti

(Sat, 10 July)

Day Itinerary

Enjoy morning and afternoon game drives in the Serengeti. The area between the Sand and Bolagonga Rivers occasional hosts a few elusive Black Rhino that wander across from the Masai Mara Game Reserve to the North and the Granite hills to the south provide an excellent habitat for Leopard which are frequently sighted. In addition every river line hosts it's own pride of lions while the wide open grass areas support a healthy population of Cheetah making this area a wildlife photographers a dream.

Day Itinerary

Enjoy morning and afternoon game drives in the Serengeti which typically start out with a quick drive up the river to get a feel of where the herds are massing, and if the signs are all pointing to a crossing, then we will figure out which side of the river we want to position ourselves and then perhaps wait to see how things unfold.

Enjoy morning and afternoon game drives in the Serengeti. If it's apparent that a crossing is unlikely then we will continue onwards to the Hills to search for Leopard or perhaps drive up one of the many streams that dot the landscape to see whatever other wildlife is out and about.

Day 10: Kahawa House, Arusha

(Tues, 13 July)

Day Itinerary

After a leisurely breakfast, we transfer to the Kogatende Airstrip to begin our onward journey. The scenic two-hour flight to Arusha offers sweeping aerial views of the African landscape - vast plains, meandering rivers, and remote villages - before landing around midday. Upon arrival, we are met and transferred to Kahawa House, where we can freshen up, enjoy lunch, and relax using the available facilities. For those with evening international departures, there is ample time to rest before your transfer to the airport. However, if your onward travel requires an overnight stay in Arusha, we can gladly arrange an additional night at Kahawa House upon request.

The name Tanzania conjures up images of wildebeest stampeding across vast savannah, rain forests teeming with monkeys and birdlife, and great plains brimming with legions of game. All of these natural wonders and more are on offer in this exceptionally diverse African nation. Visitors typically visit Tanzania to partake in at least one of the four well known Tanzanian tourist experiences: a relaxing seaside vacation on the picturesque island paradise of Zanzibar, an underwater tour of some of the world's most renowned dive sites around the gorgeous Spice Islands, a safari adventure in some of Africa's most impressive game reserves, or a hiking excursion around Mount Kilimanjaro National Park. Whichever of these incredible holidays you choose, you will undoubtedly be welcomed by some fabulously friendly and peaceful inhabitants who, despite being divided into 120 different ethnic groups and cultures, live in harmony with one another and provide some of the most wonderfully exotic local cuisine you could imagine. With all of this diversity on offer, the most difficult part of your Tanzanian holiday experience is likely to be deciding where to go!

Travel, Transport and Getting Around

If you are visiting a number of parks and reserves in Tanzania, you can either drive or fly between them. Roads in most of the wilderness areas are in poor condition and unmarked, and self-driving is not recommended. Operators will supply you with a driver who doubles as an informal guide; alternatively, you can arrange to fly to your destination and utilize a car and driver supplied by the lodgings. Elsewhere in Tanzania, towns and cities are linked by a steady stream of buses and dala-dalas (minibuses), and in the cities, there is public transport in the way of buses, dala-dalas, taxis, and, in some places, bicycles or tuk-tuks.

Precision Air run regular services, mostly via Dar es Salaam, Kilimanjaro or Zanzibar, to all main towns and other destinations in East Africa and beyond. All national parks and some of the top-end luxury lodges have airstrips and Coastal Air operates between these and the main airports on the mainland and the islands of Zanzibar, Pemba and Mafia. Zanzibar has frequent connections between Zanzibar, Pemba and the mainland. Driving is on the left hand side of the road

Food, Drink and Cuisine Advice

Most camps, lodges or hotels cater specifically to tourists and serve Western-style food, ranging in standard, but generally are excellent. Game lodges tend to offer a daily set menu with a limited selection, so it is advisable to have your tour operator specify in advance if you are a vegetarian or have other specific dietary requirements. First-time visitors to Africa might take note that most game lodges in and around the national parks have isolated locations, and driving within the parks is neither permitted nor advisable after dark, so that there is no realistic alternative to eating at your lodge. Tap water in Tanzania is generally not safe to drink, and most travelers try to stick to mineral water. Filtered and bottled water can be difficult to find if you are traveling outside of main town and so it is advisable to stock up. Most camps, lodges and hotels have bottled water readily available.

Banking and Currency

Currency

In Tanzania, the unit of currency is the Tanzanian Shilling, which is divided into 100 Cents. Notes are issued in denominations of 500, 1000, 2000, 5000, and 10000 Shillings. Coins are issued in denominations of 50, 100 and 200 Shillings.

Banking

Banks are open from 9:00am to 3:00pm Monday to Friday. Many banks are equipped with 24 hour ATM machines. Credit cards and travellers checks are not widely accepted in Tanzania. Where they are accepted can high service fees and poor exchange rates be expected. Major foreign currencies - particularly US \$ - are accepted in Tanzania and are convertible at banks and *bureau de changes* in the main towns and tourist areas. If bringing cash in US \$, please make sure bank notes are in good condition, with no cuts or damage and are not older than 2004. Most banks offer higher exchange rates for US \$ 100 / US \$ 50 bank notes compared to US \$ 20 / US \$ 10 or US \$ 5 bank notes.

Clothing and Dress Recommendations

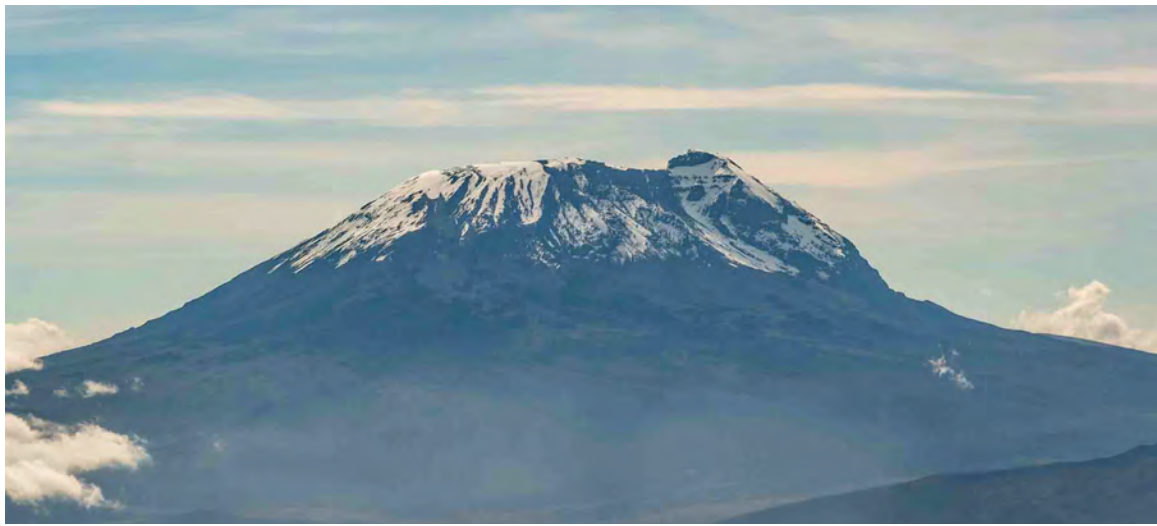
It never gets really cold in Tanzania so lightweight clothing, preferably cotton or linen, is recommended. While on a game viewing safari, avoid brightly colored clothing, stick to whites, beiges, khakis and browns. There may be long days sitting in safari vehicles, so it is advisable to wear light comfortable clothing such as short sleeved shirts and cotton/linen trousers or shorts. Denim will become too hot and extremely uncomfortable. Walking shoes and socks will be required. The evenings will be chilly, so long sleeved shirts and trousers should be worn. A sweater may be needed. These will also prevent you being bitten by insects. A hat should be worn at all times outside. The sun may sometimes not feel hot, but it can still easily burn, especially if it is cloudy and overcast. If visiting Zanzibar or any coastal town don't forget to take a swimsuit, as it is invariably warm. Ladies are recommended to take cotton skirts, blouses and dresses. Sandals are a must for this environment! On the beaches and within the confines of hotels, normal swimwear is acceptable but nudity is not. As over a third of the population in Tanzania is Muslim, it is therefore not etiquette for ladies to walk around in public displaying their legs and shoulders. Remember to dress modestly as short shorts, miniskirts, vests and tank tops will be frowned upon.

Electricity and Plug Standards

The electricity supply in Tanzania is 220/240 volts at 50Hz. Plugs are 3 point square (UK Type). Adapters are available at major airports.

Climate and Weather

Just south of the equator, Tanzania is huge and its sheer size means that the climate varies considerably within it. However, generally the main rainy season, or the 'long rains', lasts during about March, April and May. Afternoon tropical downpours are the norm – which are heavier and more predictable beside the coast and on the islands. The humidity is high and daily temperatures reach the low-mid 30°s. The long dry season lasts June to October when rainfall is unusual, even on the islands. Temperatures vary hugely with altitude and location, but it's usually a fine, clear sky and sunny weather – it's a great time to visit Tanzania. During November and December there's another rainy season: the 'short rains'. These are much lighter than the main rains and less reliable. If it has rained during the short rains, then it normally dries up for a few months, January and February, which is Tanzania's 'short dry season' before starting to rain again in earnest in March.

PASSPORT & VISA'S REQUIREMENTS:

Most passport holders require visas for Tanzania, Kenya, Zambia, Zimbabwe, Botswana & Namibia. Visas are obtainable from the High Commission of each country. Remember that visa requirements can change with little or no notice. Please double-check foreign entry requirements according to your nationality by contacting the High Commissions. Please note it's your responsibility to obtain visas we accept no liability for your failure to do so. Visas for certain passport holders can be purchased upon arrival at Livingstone Airport and paid for in USD, GBP, EUR OR ZMW. We recommend that Kaza Uni-Visa is purchased in order to be able to have access to Botswana and Zimbabwe for guest activities.

YELLOW FEVER & MALARIA:

A Yellow Fever inoculation IS compulsory for Kenya. Tanzania, Kenya, Zambia, Zimbabwe, Namibia and Botswana are malaria risk areas - please consult your physician/travel clinic before you travel to Africa for advice on precautions against malaria.
